

# **Session Descriptions**

Friday, May 01, 2020

#### 1A - Tell Me What Is Real - Robert McClure

In a post-truth era of alternative facts, fake news, and endless opportunity for us to share our opinions online, the ability to ascertain the veracity, and credibility of information has found renewed importance.

Looking to the future, library professionals are well suited to help others find credible information, but first we must learn how to do so ourselves. Through this session, library staff will learn various techniques to identify dependable information created by credible sources, and how to pass these on to their clientele.

#### 1B - Who Are The Friends of the Library - Crystal Friars and David Guba

Learn how the Stettler Friends of the Library Society expanded their fundraising focus on more than just book sales. During the 2018-2019 year, the Stettler Friends launched two new fundraising initiatives that have helped advocate for the Stettler Public Library and at the same time raise money for the Library. This session focuses on the Christmas Wine Survivor and Historic Ghost Walk events and the learning curves that the Stettler Friends of the Library Society has experienced along the way.

#### 1C - Beyond The Booktalk - Valerie Viccars

Feeling stuck or bored trying to figure out what to do for your next booktalking presentation? Discover some fresh new ideas for crafting your next talk! Once you have the basics of delivering a book talk, this session takes you to the next level; putting it all together to create an engaging and unforgettable full book talk presentation. Learn tips on how to assemble and shape a presentation around a variety of themes or delivery methods. You will take away some fresh ideas, and be able to share your successes with the group.

# 2A - Naughty, Nice, or Nixed: A Censorship Redux - Deb Cryderman and Clayton Tiro-Burns

An overview of censorship in libraries, including the censorship we commit ourselves, and that which our community imposes upon us. We'll explore how misinformation can be a form of censorship. We will wrap up with a practical exercise so everyone can play.

#### 2B - Closing The Cultural Gap - Brandi Roper

Learn how the Stettler Public Library partnered with local Hutterite colony schools to build a relationship and spark a love of reading among children. An initial adventure into unknown territory, this outreach program has been wildly successful in building relationships with local communities, and has resulted in increased in-person visits to the library. This session will focus on lessons learned while establishing and running this outreach program, and will look at strategies that have worked to build relationships and expand community participation.

#### 2C - Moving the Glenbow Library and Archives - Brenna Burwash

In 2019, the Glenbow's library and archives began their move to its new home at the University of Calgary. This presentation will cover how the move was planned and executed, along with some of the challenges encountered.

#### 3A - Show Your Value In The Learning Commons - Dawn Dickson

Librarians are the key to the success of any Learning Commons. In the current climate of changing priorities for education, we need to show our value in the school Learning Commons more than ever! So much of what we do is invisible to our staff and administration. Ideas on how to reveal the magic you perform on a daily basis so your hard work is seen and appreciated.

#### 3B - Get the Money, Honey! - Hailey McCullough

The COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in economic upheaval, leaving businesses and organizations, including libraries, struggling with budget decreases. Library staff must now get creative with other ways to fund their libraries. This conference session will examine the different methods library professionals can utilize to obtain library funding, looking at what needs to be fulfilled in a post-pandemic world. Come learn about sponsorships, donations, grants, and more.

#### 3C - Great Reads K-4 - Valerie Viccars

Learn about all the best new books for early readers! This session surveys literature for young kids (Grades K-4) including picture books, beginning readers, chapter books and kids non-fiction. Come away enthused about kidlit and ready to help young children learn to love reading.

This session will demonstrate how programming in your Learning Commons is an essential element in providing both educational outcomes as well as creating a welcoming space within the school. Several program ideas will be shown how they can be used across grade levels with slight tweaks. Be prepared to do some hands-on activities!

Richard Van Camp is a proud Tlicho Dene from Fort Smith, NWT. He is the best-selling author of 26 books in just about every genre. Jay Bardyla - Jay has created a thriving community of literate nerds throughout Alberta. As a co-owner of the Edmonton-based Happy Harbor Comics (1999-2019), he helped build an innovative and international award-winning business that offered a variety of opportunities to artists, writers and educators.

Happy Harbor visited hundreds of schools and libraries to spread the joy of comics, creativity and literacy, also donating more than \$10,000 worth of comics back to libraries with their Comic Book Fair program. His store was also the first in Canada to develop and maintain a Comics Artist-in-Residence program, which supported creators financially as well as creatively.

After a brief hiatus Jay has returned to the world of pop culture with his new shop Rolling Tales. With some modern tech and a refreshed outlook on how to share the world of comics, this new enterprise will work to bring even more comics to the masses.

He continues to sit on the Board of Directors for the Comics Legends Legal Defense Fund and We Are Here Canada, is an occasional guest instructor at Pixel Blue Art College, and a regular presenter and Keynote Speaker at Library conferences across the Province.

Valerie Viccars is a Family Literacy Librarian and certified Parent-Child Mother Goose teacher. She obtained her Masters in Library and Information Studies in 2005. Prior to branching out on her own, Valerie was the Manager of Early Literacy and Children's Services at the Calgary Public Library. She began the At Home with Mother Goose program as a way to provide more flexibility in early literacy programming for busy parents and caregivers. Along with early literacy programming, she also delivers adult education training on topics such as children's literature and programming skills.

Sarah Stephens graduated from the SAIT LIT program in 2004 and has worked in a variety of positions at Mount Royal University ever since. She is currently the Head, User Services and Engagement managing the Public

Services team. Sarah is a longtime member of AALT and has served on the Board of Directors many times, twice as President.

Robert McClure accepted his first library job in 2006 and has been having fun ever since. As the CEO of Yellowhead County Libraries, Robert thrives when collaborating with other community groups, and enjoys facilitating professional development sessions for his staff and convincing non-library users to sign up for a library card.
